

### Here's why daily attendance is crucial and how you can help:



Our families play an essential role in shaping students' perspectives and behaviors regarding school attendance. As we continue the 2024-25 school year, the Wagoner family looks forward to partnering with you to ensure our students receive the best academic experience possible.

#### Why Daily Attendance Matters

#### 1. Academic Achievement:

 Regular attendance is directly linked to improved academic performance. In the early elementary years, students are learning to read, write and build foundational math skills. Missing even a few days can disrupt the flow of learning, making it challenging for students to keep pace with lessons.

#### 2. Social and Emotional Development:

 Daily school attendance aids children in forming relationships with peers and teachers, which enhances their social abilities and emotional resilience.

#### 3. Establishing Routine:

 Consistent attendance helps create a routine that prepares children for future responsibilities, such as college and employment.

#### How Families Can Encourage Positive Attendance

# **RICKOVER UPDATE**



The eighth graders participated in District 206's Annual Manufacturers Day, where they had the opportunity to explore careers in Career and Technical Education (CTE).








RJHS proudly celebrates **Hispanic Heritage Month**, honoring the rich history, culture and contributions of Hispanic and Latino communities.
